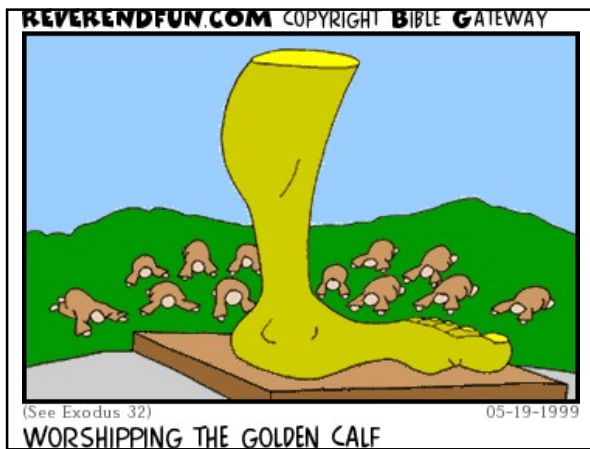

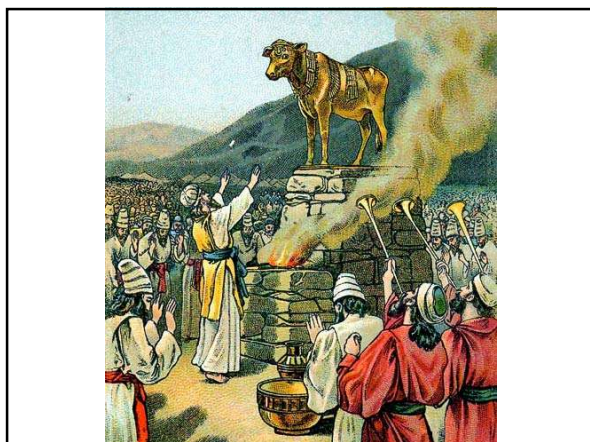

The gods of power work from one shared premise: we can take care of ourselves. We can handle all our needs. The Lord is nice, but he really isn't necessary. We don't need to pray for our daily bread because we've got a pantry full of it. The gods of power appeal to our self-sufficiency.

6: the temple of power
a: the god of success

The god of success has no problem finding followers. He is attractive, compelling, charismatic. He walks into your everyday, rat-race world and shows you what life could be at the top of the heap. And what he's selling is hard to ignore. He offers us the applause and envy that makes life sweet.

This god gives us a line as old as the garden of Eden: "You can run the whole thing. It's your life, so why shouldn't you be at the wheel? Why not put the pedal down and see how fast you can get to the finish line?"

The god of success are all about personal achievement, rewards we chase and get for ourselves. Is life going to be good? Are we going to be satisfied? The gods of success give us very convenient ways to keep score: the title after our name, the sum on our paycheck, the square footage of the new house. We put our hope and find our identity in what the god of success offers. And so we climb and claw our way to the top.

*Worshipping the gods of success isn't just about secular accomplishments and commendations. It's not just getting caught up with job titles and social status. In fact one of the most common gods of success is the worship of religious rules. We put our trust in our mastery of rule-keeping.

So in God's economy, success only comes when we declare spiritual bankruptcy.

a: the god of success
keeping score

Success wants us to bow down to a position in society – a pecking order, if you will. Money is certainly a component of that, because that's what we most often use to keep score. For most of us, it's a key ingredient to success, but it's not just about the money. It's about prestige and clout. It's about respect and recognition. It's about having the right seat at the table, the right space in the parking lot, the right title on the business card, and the right clothes in the closet. It's about getting the watch, the trophy, the promotion, or the award.

Success is finding out how the score is kept, and then scoring.

Money has grown so dominant in our culture that it's difficult for us to stand far enough back to get a perspective. No matter what we may say, many of us live as if the pursuit of wealth is the real goal in life. Sometimes we hear rich people say things like "money doesn't make you happy," but most of us think they all flew first class to some exotic destination where they got together and agreed to say that to make the rest of us feel better.

We pay lip service to the idea that money isn't that important, but how we spend our time and what we pursue seem to reveal our true belief. Money by the ton is the ultimate dream for so many people. When they talk about an ultimate fantasy it's winning the lottery or inheriting a fortune from some rich relative.

**c: the god of achievement
merit badges and award ceremonies**

- Martha was distracted
- Mary had chosen

The god of achievement distracts us from following Jesus by distracting us with all the things we need to get done. How often do we live with good intentions of spending time with Jesus and turning our heart toward him only to find at the end of the day that's the one thing on our checklist that we never got around to?

**c: the god of achievement
symptoms**

1. A constant frustration with people in your life who, from your perspective, aren't getting it done.
2. A constant sense of discontentment with yourself for not getting done what you hoped you would.

When we worship the god of achievement, getting things done and getting things done right becomes more important than almost anything or anyone else.

Idolizing & Idle-lizing

**c: the god of achievement
choose that which is better first**

This is the ADD / ADHD generation*

We're always on the move, always trying to get something done. Our phones are constantly dingling to let us know there is a text we need to return or an appointment we're going to be late for.

**squirrel*

c: the god of achievement
choose that which is better first

How many times have we been so distracted that we've missed a divine moment? How many things does God long to say to us, but he keeps getting our voicemail because we're too busy to pick up?

*Working hard and achieving goals are an important part of a God-glorifying life. But they are **not** life. They are not even a measuring stick for the worth of life.*

Remember the golden calf?

choose that which is better first

God doesn't want our rèsùmès; he wants us.
