## Being One, Part:6 Unbreaking the Body Hennie Swart

## INTRODUCTION

- Our concept of 'membership' comes from this analogy of Paul.
- In this whole section (1 Cor 12-14), Paul argues strongly for 'unity in diversity', not 'unity without diversity' (uniformity) or 'diversity without unity' (division), like the unified sound of a diverse orchestra!
- Paul has both the universal body ('we' in 12.13) and local body ('you' in 12.27) in mind

## 1 CORINTHIANS 12.12-27 (ESV)

<sup>12</sup>For just as [a] body is one and has many members, and all the members of [a] body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. <sup>13</sup>For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body---Jews or Greeks, slaves or free--and all were made to drink of one Spirit.

 $^{14}\mathrm{For}$  the body does not consist of one member but of many.  $^{15}\mathrm{lf}$  the foot should say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body.  $^{16}\mathrm{And}$  if the ear should say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body.

1 CORINTHIANS 12.12-27 (ESV)	
<sup>17</sup> If the whole body were an eye, where would be the sense of hearing? If the whole body were an ear, where would be the sense of smell? <sup>18</sup> But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. <sup>19</sup> If all were a single member, where would the body be? <sup>20</sup> As it is, there are many parts, yet one body. <sup>21</sup> The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you."

1 CORINTHIANS 12.12-27 (ESV)	
<sup>22</sup> On the contrary, the parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, <sup>23</sup> and on those parts of the body that we think less honorable we bestow the greater	
honor, and our unpresentable parts are treated with greater modesty, <sup>24</sup> which our more presentable parts do not require. But God has so composed the body, giving	
greater honor to the part that lacked it, <sup>25</sup> that there may be no division in the body, but that the members may have the same care for one another. <sup>26</sup> If one member	
suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together.	
<sup>27</sup> Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it.
