
Authority and identity

Dreams still come true First Great Awakening 1727-1766

- Started with 24/7 prayer, Herrnhut, Germany
- 100 years uninterrupted
- 300 radical missionaries over 65 years
- Impacted America and England
- 1740-1742, 30 000 new members and 9 universities
- Mission work amongst Indians in America started
- Edwards, Wesley, Whitefield foundations for revivals to come

Dreams still come true Second Great Awakening, 1791-1822

- Began as prayer movement in Britain and US in 1784 every Monday night.
- Context: American War of Independence, French Revolution, sexual immorality, rationalism, declining church attendance, industrialization.
- Explosion of world missionary organisations & bible societies.
- Slave trade abolished, prisons reformed, schools and orphanages started.
- Scandinavia, Germany, Switzerland, US, Scotland, Ireland

Dreams still come true Third Great Awakening, 1830-1842

- Charles Finney 100 000 souls in one year in US.
- George Muller orphanage work and living by faith.
- Doctrine of the church, return of Christ, free will of man, spiritual gifts and apostolic ministries restored.
- Reached South Africa, Pacific Islands, India, Ceylon etc.

Dreams still come true Third Great Awakening, 1830-1842 George Muller:

- Cared for 10 024 orphans (first 30 in his own home)
- Provided excellent education to orphans
- Accused by some of "raising the poor above their natural station in British life".
- Nearby factories and mines lost access to cheap labour.
- Established 117 schools for more than 120 000 children.
- Never asked for money and never went into debt

Third Great Awakening, 1830-1842 George Muller:

"A brother in the Lord came to me this morning and, after a few minutes of conversation gave me two thousand pounds for furnishing the new Orphan House...Now I am able to meet all the expenses. In all probability I will even have several hundred pounds more than I need. The Lord not only give as much as is absolutely necessary for his work, but he gives abundantly. This blessing filled me with inexplicable delight. He had given me the full answer to my thousands of prayers during the [past] 1,195 days." The Autobiography of George Muller, p198

Dreams still come true Fourth Great Awakening, 1857

- Started in Canada, 21 saved, then 25-40 daily.
- September, 1857 Wednesday lunch prayer meeting daily
- 6 months later 10 000 businessmen across America met daily, repentance and prayer.
- 1,000,000 souls in two years in America
- February to June 1858 50 000 people/week
- UK 1,000,000

Dreams still come true Fourth Great Awakening, 1857

- William and Catherine Booth, Salvation Army
- Charles Spurgeon England
- Lord Shaftesbury next gen, poor and oppressed
- Hudson Taylor China Inland Mission
- David Livingstone in Africa
- Europe, Western Russia, Australia, South Seas, South Africa and India

Lord Shaftesbury

"Ashley grew up without any experience of parental love. He saw little of his parents, and when duty or necessity compelled them to take notice of him they were formal and frightening."

"The place [school] was bad, wicked, filthy, and the treatment was starvation and cruelty."



A godly housekeeper shapes a destiny

"This difficult childhood was softened by the affection he received from his housekeeper Maria Mills and his sisters. Mills provided for Ashley a model of Christian love that would the basis for much of his later social activism and philanthropic work...she told him Bible stories, she taught him a prayer."

By teenage years he had become a committed Christian.

- Dwight L Moody
- Interdenominational student missionary movement
- Cambridge 7
- World Student Christian Federation
- 4000 30000 4 years in Japan
- Revivals in China, India, South Africa (Andrew Murray)
- Wales Revival, 100 000 in 6 months
- Azusa Street Revival daily meetings for 3 years
- Charismatic and Pentecostal explosion of church growth
